We need to always be open to the new realities of our industry that are now made possible through technology."

Mélie Matifat, VP, People and Culture, agrees. "With a flexible mindset, we understand that one size does not fit all, which is why this return is not mandatory. We know things will sometimes fail, but a crucial element of our culture is this sense of humility and ability to adapt and improve. This plays a key role in facing this new reality."

"The strength of our teams is built on relationships, which can be hard to develop virtually. We want to build solid relationships across everyone in the organization," says Mélie Matifat.

Mélie continued, "We know people have all they need at home. [At] the end of the day, we can't compete based on material things. We want to focus on what you can't get from a home office."

The new space was created to fulfill one large need that can't be duplicated in a remote work setting. And while mini golf and open hang out space is a recipe for fun, this need isn't a material thing at all. Instead, it's all about the sense of belonging that only in-person work can provide.

"We have a lot of new faces and we don't really know each other. We need a space where people can work together since Intelcom is a team at its core." Jean-Sébastien adds. In person, you have that opportunity to connect on a more personal level. I want to know people's lives, what they're up to, etc. That isn't something back-to-back meetings allow."
